Patch of Turf

Run Time: 18 minutes Number of Performers: 4

By way of an 8' x 12' square patch of artificial grass, Patch of Turf (2015) tells of Man/Womankind in a diminishing natural environment. Set to a commissioned score by Qasim Naqvi, the work is an intense tour de force for four virtuosic female performers. The work is both ironic in its depiction of nature vis-à-vis the artificial grass and poignant in revealing both our estrangement from the natural world and competition and dominance over it.

Falling Sky

Falling Sky provides a counterpoint and new perspective to the critical subject matter of the environment presented within its partner piece, Patch of Turf, inverting the motifs and structure of the original piece, exploring and testing dichotomies such as Organic/Artificial, Earth/Air, Biology/Spiritual, External/Internal within a greater context of a human relationship to the environment. With the immediacy of climate change today, Falling Sky addresses the moral obligation to consider both earthbound and existential interactions, the natural world and the impact of society's insatiable appetite for its resources.

Dark Water

In Dark Water, Pott joins with composer Qasim Nagvi and visual artist Nicola Lopez, to explore the power, depth and ubiquity of water. Dark Water is the third and final installment, with Patch of Turf and Falling Sky of the three-part Anima series that explores humankind's fraught relationship with the natural world. Nagvi, whose musical work traverses multiple musical genres and traditions - electronic, jazz, orchestral, percussion - has composed a haunting score that forms a liquid-like backdrop for Pott's movement sequences where dancers appear alternately as if submerged underwater, as if transformed into deep ocean life forms, or as if moved amidst the invisible currents and tides of the seas. among the most powerful forces on the planet.
